Religious Education

Today, Ash Wednesday, we begin our Lenten journey for 2019. Jesus spent 40 days in the desert to prepare Himself for His mission of love. When I was very young Lent was very much about giving up favourite foods, extra praying and being 'good'. It was also a time when certain observances were enacted in the Church...purple vestments, covering of all statues and icons, fasting each Friday, attending reconciliation and penance. These earthly practices often get confused with the deep symbolism and intended message of Lent.

The message is simple yet powerful and sometimes it's good to stop and remember the message of Lent. Jesus reminds us of God... the God of love, truth and forgiveness. Constantly Jesus went off to a lonely place to be with His Father, to grow in relationship with Him and to renew His spirit and get some clarity about the meaning of life and communion with God himself.

The heart of Lent is making a space for God. That means loosening our control and being open to what needs to come into our lives. This is a huge challenge for us all in the busyness of everyday living. The season of Lent reminds us to focus on what is essential to everyday life and we have 40 days of focused and constant reminding in the period of Lent.

The ashes of Ash Wednesday carry a sense of urgency. They remind us that we are not permanent residents here on earth, that in fact life is quite short. This makes Lent a valuable time for examining our direction, refocusing our priorities, and making sure that God is at the centre of our lives. We need this time of Lent each year to open ourselves to being captured anew by the love of God and to finding ways for the love we have received to flow through us to others.

The children are learning about the many scriptural and religious meanings and symbolism of Lent as we head towards the glorious resurrection of Jesus at Easter in April. During this first week of Lent we have had a *whole school scripture focus based on the Gospel of St Matthew 4: 1-4 "Jesus Was Tempted When He Was Hungry"*. I encourage you to talk about what they are learning in regards to Lent. They have such a deep, simple and loving trust of prayer and sacrifice for Lent.

Complaints or Grievances pertaining to School Issues

Our mission at St. John Vianney's is to be the lived example of Christ, where the dignity of each individual is valued and the rights and beliefs of all members of the community are respected. Our school is a place where Christian values and beliefs permeate, resulting in a climate where every child feels safe, secure, accepted and loved.

Complaints or grievances pertaining to school issues that relate to other children are to be dealt with by school personnel.

Just a reminder, it is <u>not appropriate</u> for parents to approach other parents/carers or their children with the intention of resolving an issue. Approaching other children in this manner is a breach of Child Protection. The first point of contact should always be the school.

The recommended procedure to be followed by parents is:

1. The first point of contact is the child's classroom teacher.

Contact the school office to make an appointment with the teacher concerned.

2. If parents/carers are not satisfied with the solutions offered or believe that they have not been given a fair hearing, they are encouraged to make an appointment with the Assistant Principal or Principal, to discuss the issues further.

Parents/Carers are reminded that there are two sides to every story and whilst it is important to listen to their children, it is also important not to draw conclusions or make accusations until all the facts are known.

School based complaints may be put in writing using the *Complaint Form* and the Assistant Principal or Principal establishes a process to deal with the complaint by:

- · addressing the seriousness of the complaint;
- assessing the appropriateness of each option for resolution;
- keeping the resolution as close to the source of the complaint as possible.
- 3. If the school leadership team does not resolve the matter in a timely manner, or parents believe the outcome is unacceptable, parents should contact the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta who has procedures for ensuring that complaints are handled fairly.

St. John Vianney's Coding Club

This year, St. John Vianney's Parish School started its own Coding Club with the Year 6 students leading the way. Thirty students from the Year 6 classes signed up and are now meeting once a week to create projects using coding.

What is Computer Coding?

Computer "coding" or "programming" means writing step by step instructions that tell computers what to do.

Coding allows devices to do what they are designed to do. Example, mobile phones are able to send messages, make phone calls, or find contacts because of coding. Children get to enjoy games, browsing through the internet or create documents because of the code of the programmer.

What is SJV Coding Club?

St. John Vianney's Coding Club is an avenue for our students to:

- create interactive stories, games, and animations through coding
- to develop their skills to collaborate, create, communicate and problem solve through coding projects
- share their talents and learnings with their fellow students at St. John Vianney's

What platforms will we use?

The club will utilise Scratch Jr., Hopscotch, Phyton and micro:bit, among others, as platforms to create projects.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCEEVERY LEARNER, EVERY DAY!

- ♦ School attendance plays a critical role in enhancing the lives of students in schools.
- Every day of attendance adds to a students' academic achievement and success at school.
- If a student is not at school, they can't be part of the learning.
- A student who is consistently late to school misses the learning too!
- School attendance is compulsory for every school age student.

It's OK to NOT be at school if you are sick or there is some kind of disaster ... but it is not OK to be away because you slept in, didn't feel like coming to school, went shopping, met up with friends.

At St John Vianney's we are monitoring school attendance as one part of building your child's success at school. We will communicate with you if we become concerned about your child's attendance.

If your child's attendance is less than 90% attendance for this term, we will contact you either by phone or letter to make you aware of your child's attendance rate.

Parents can help by promoting the importance of school by:

- ✓ ensuring your child attends school every day
- √ arriving at school punctually (school begins at 8:55am)
- √ leading by example ... be organised and ready

We are keen to support parents in developing and consolidating good attendance habits in every student.

ABSENT FROM SCHOOL

If your child is away from school could you please advise the office via phone, email or the Skoolbag App by 9:30am on the day they are absent. Thank you!

ABSENCES

It is an expectation that student attend school every day and arrive on time. The school day begins at 8:55am and ends at 3pm. If your child is away due to sickness, medical appointment or a family matter a note or doctor's certificate should be sent to the classroom teacher on their return to school. If you are intending to take your child out of school for leave for less than 5 days please send a note to the class teacher or contact the school office by phone, email or via the Skoolbag App.

APPLICATION FOR EXTENDED LEAVE

If the period of leave is for 5 days or more, please provide a letter to the Principal detailing the reasons for extended leave and attach the completed Application for Extended leave. There is no guarantee that extended leave will be approved. All applications are considered on an individual basis, taking into account the reason for leave, the student's academic progress, their attendance history and the impact this leave may have on the student's progress.

These regulations are in place in all schools in the Parramatta Diocese to make sure that all students have the best opportunity to achieve to their full potential. We appreciate your support and understanding of these requirements.

What Reading is Best?

Reading and speaking are arguably at the corner-stone of all learning. In talking about reading with students and even other teachers it is interesting to get an insight into different perspectives of reading. Today I heard:

- Reading the newspaper is boring, is biased and does not count for quality reading
- · Good reading means that you should be reading a thick novel
- It isn't ok to read magazine articles a lot
- Funny books don't count
- Reading online texts is something to avoid

I disagree with all of this. I can see why people believe each point: the newspaper often has articles that are on topics that are outside of my interest and like all information, comes from an author with their own perspective. Novels often involve complex vocabulary, characterisation and a story-line. Reading any one text a lot can refine your experience of text. Funny books can contain simple text. Children can spend a significant amount of time online and promoting more time using devices can seem hazardous.

But what is important is the thinking that goes into reading and the discussion that it can generate. Any reading that invokes enjoyment and thought is beneficial. Certainly expanding a repertoire of genre is healthy as well as exposure to broad vocabulary. My concern is children are reading material that they have little choice in and find frustrating. When a book becomes detrimental to reading the question needs to be asked what benefit is it giving? It is good to challenge children with different text types and complexity, but it is important to involve the child in the process of selecting a book.

Texts such as Dork Diaries. Diary of a Whimpy Kid, the Tree House series and the like, all are highly popular and very easy reads. They are creative and inspire ideas. As much as they do not contain highly complex vocabulary or story-lines, they do provide opportunities for fun rich discussion. The newspaper can be another great source of discussion and can contain a range of visual literature, communicating information through photos, graphs and tables. As children mature, the conversation can shift to objectivity

and ethics: a great way to touch on our faith and values.

This is a table that I shared last year in terms of the impact home reading can have on children. I would like to re-share this and add that if the quality of reading is raised through discussion, enjoyment and student choice, the impact this could make on a child can be great.



WITHDRAWAL OF ENROLMENT

Please note that under the School Fee Policy as set out by the Catholic Education Office Parramatta:

"A term's notice (10 school weeks) in writing must be given to the Principal before the removal of a student or a full term's fees will be payable. The notice can be given any time during term for the next term.

One exception is that notice in writing will be accepted at any time during Term 4 in relation to the following year's enrolment, that is, the notice period of 10 school weeks will be waived in this circumstance".
