Greetings! Parents and Carers,

SEMESTER 1 REPORTS

At St John Vianney's, we have developed high expectations for our students' learning.

The Semester 1 Reports will be sent home this Friday 21st June. This report is a reflection of your child's learning, social development and work habits for the first semester. A great deal of time and consideration goes into awarding grades for each student. Grades are allocated based on a number of variables, such as, student work samples, assessment tasks, observations and class work. Please note that your child's grades may have varied from previous years, especially if they have moved into a new Stage this year.

REMEMBER: C is to **Celebrate**. C is the **EXPECTED** level for most students. It is where they are supposed to be at this time in their learning. **EFFORT is very important** when you read the report because it shows how hard the child is working regardless of their E-A grading. For example, a student might get a D or E, but if they get a great EFFORT response, then it shows they are working to the best of their ability.

You may also like to keep in mind the following four tips:

- **1.** Look for strengths first Focus on and acknowledge your child's strengths and achievements within all of the 7 Key Learning Areas.
- 2. Take into account your child's effort and attitude to learning If the report indicates that effort needs attention, then they have something to work on. If your child is putting in the required effort, speak to your child about how pleasing this is and how it has a positive impact on their learning.
- 3. Acknowledge your child's work habits and social development How your child gets along with his or her peers will influence their happiness and well being. Take the time to acknowledge their application to these areas of socialisation and self-discipline.
- 4. Discuss the report with your son or daughter talking about his/her achievements and where to next Ask for your child's opinion about how they have performed and discuss any concerns and areas for improvement. Set some learning goals together.

TERM 3 - PUPIL FREE DAYS

During Term 3 there will be \underline{two} pupil free days in place to support the on-going professional learning of our staff.

There will be NO SCHOOL FOR ALL STUDENTS on

Monday 22nd July – Term 3 – Week 1 – Literacy Focus and

Monday 2nd September – Term 3 – Week 7 – Numeracy Focus

Staff will be working together to refine their teaching and learning strategies in Literacy and Numeracy.

We will begin the term with our Literacy Staff Development day. This day of learning is focused on our school Literacy Goal of Reading Comprehension. The teachers will work with current student data to develop and refine comprehension strategies to meet student needs, particularly in identifying and assisting students to set and achieve their reading goals.

In week 7, our Staff Development day will focus on Numeracy. This day of learning is focused on our school Numeracy Goal of Mathematical Reasoning. The staff will work with current student data to develop and refine Mathematical Reasoning skills. This will support students to develop clear mathematical understandings, challenging them to analyse, justify and generalise whilst problem solving.

MOBILE PHONES

We have noted that a considerable number of students have been using their mobile phones of an afternoon. On occasion, parents have messaged their children to ask their children to meet them outside after school. This is not safe, as we cannot supervise dismissal with children meeting parents ad hoc on the street. As always, if parents have an important message for their children, please contact the school office and it will be passed on. Mobile phones that are being used by students during school hours will be confiscated and returned to parents as part of a parent meeting regarding appropriate use of technology.

INAPPROPRIATE USE OF TECHNOLOGY

Sadly, it has been brought to our attention that some students at St John Vianney's have been accessing social media inappropriately, posting some very unacceptable comments/videos about other students.

While, this has not occurred during school hours it is very concerning to discover that students at St. John Vianney's are accessing social media, such as, Tik Tok, Facebook and Instagram and using it inappropriately. *The minimum age to open an account on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest, Tumblr, Kik, and Snapchat is 13.* You may recognise these social media names, but how much do you know about them? These are only a few, and your children may be using others. Look into the sites your children are using or want to join and learn about them together. Despite these clearly stated and published age restrictions, large and growing numbers of children age 12 and under are using social media networks.

Learning to navigate social media safely with your children is all about awareness, communication, and supervision.

Let your children know to stop and think before they post comments or pictures and to NEVER share personal information like age, school, address, full name or when parents are not home. Anything posted or sent through the Internet is impossible to fully remove. Please, communicate this to your children.

Just because children seem tech-savvy at increasingly younger ages, doesn't necessarily mean that their brains are developing at the same rate. Research shows that it takes children about 12 years to fully develop the cognitive structures that enable them to engage in ethical thinking. Before 12 it's difficult, if not impossible, for a child to fully grasp the impact of their actions upon others, online or otherwise. Yet young children are increasingly joining social networking sites, sometimes even putting themselves in harm's way by becoming victims of online harassment, solicitation, and cyber-bullying before they are ready to respond appropriately.

We would greatly appreciate it if you could discuss this further with your child/ren, taking note of the flyer on the next page.

Cyberbullying

Communication, Recognition, and Action Steps

Talk to your children about cyberbullying and teach them to:

- Report offensive or hurtful comments to you immediately, whether they are the target or not.
- Be careful what they say, send, post, or blog about someone else - unintentional bullying is still bullying.
 - Communication and trust are critical in cyberbullying situations. Start internet safety conversations early.

Recognize signs of cyberbullying:

- Anger, depression, or frustration after using any devices.
- Stops using devices unexpectedly.
- Stops accessing social media sites, apps, or games.
- Uneasy about going to school.
- Abnormally withdrawn from usual friends and family members.

Help your children to TAKE ACTION:

- Save the texts/posts/emails.
- · Don't reply to them and don't delete them.
- Report the ID online and Block the user from further interaction
- Inform schools and authorities about the situation

Religious Education

Last Sunday was the feast of the **Holy Trinity**, which is the great mystery of our faith – The Father, Son and Holy Spirit as one. God could be viewed as a **'family of persons'** a God of **'relationships'**. When we pray therefore, we can pray to all three calling on *God* for Divine intervention, Jesus for counsel and the Holy Spirit for wisdom or inspiration.

For Christians, the Trinity is the primary symbol of a **community** that is held together by containing diversity within itself. The language of Father and Son is **relational language**, and reminds us that, for God, as for us, created in God's image, **relationship and community are primary.** The Trinity is God's three ways of being there for us. Every time we make the sign of the cross we reaffirm our belief in a God who is Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

We are baptised "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit", and we remind ourselves of this reality when we pray and when we bless ourselves and others. Of course, many significant people come into our lives and we get a real sense that the Spirit of God is within them. Their ways, their support and their kindness are all evidence of the Holy Spirit present in our lives. I am sure many people come to mind who touch our hearts, mind and spirit on a daily basis or incidentally. It is through these people that we see the face of God.

Today let us remember the gifts we receive in baptism and confirmation: wisdom, understanding, right judgment, courage, knowledge, reverence and wonder. Let us pray that He makes these gifts come alive in us, especially in our community here at St John Vianney's Parish School. I pray that the gifts of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, humility and faithfulness will continue to bring life and inspiration to our families, our school community, our friendships, our workplaces, our neighbourhoods.....our world.

I leave you with a question to ponder.

"What have been the significant moments in your life which led you to a new understanding of God?"

ATTENDANCE and EXTENDED LEAVE

As you can see from the information above, our attendance data has improved. Please keep this up as your child's daily attendance is crucial to their learning.

The expected Diocesan benchmark for all schools is at least 90% attendance.

We are ALL responsible for ensuring that our students are at school EVERY DAY and ON TIME!

There has been a marked increase in the number of families requesting Extended Leave for holidays during crucial learning time. *Please be advised, unless the extended leave is for urgent or serious reasons, approval may not be granted.*

I remind parents, that a **letter explaining** <u>in detail</u> the reason for the leave MUST accompany the application for extended leave. All applications are considered individually and take into consideration each student's learning.

We are monitoring each student's attendance (this includes partial attendance). If a student's attendance falls below 90% we will contact parents by phone or letter to bring this to your attention.

Please contact the school office by phone (8869 6300), email or via the Skoolbag App on the morning that your child is absent so this can be recorded, and their class teacher informed. An absence of 3 days or more without notification to the school will result in a call from the school.

I had a fabulous day with my friends at the Aquarium!



On the 5th June both of the Year One classes went on a bus for one hour to go to the Sydney Aquarium. I sat next to Georgia at the front of the bus.



Opening Up New Worlds of Words!

At the end of last term I wrote about the great importance of vocabulary - of the opportunity to be exposed to new, complex and rich words, as well as the opportunity to use these. Our school's Literacy goal is to develop comprehension - and the understanding of language and breadth of words is one of the corner stones in building comprehension.

So how do we build vocabulary?

Language involves both expression and reception - output and input. What opportunities do our students have to express themselves in words, both in speaking and in writing, as well as in receiving language, in reading and in listening? More so, is this language at a high level?

Exposure to good literature is a wonderful way to build vocabulary. Quality authors draw from a wealth of words that are otherwise not often used. The more literature that children are exposed to, the more a student will use them and experiment with them too: reading quietly, being read to, listening to audiobooks.

Having time to talk. We are all time poor but how can we use the time that we are together to talk? In the car, during dinner, before bedtime. New language is driven by the adult. Expressing ourselves and clarifying words. Explaining things rather than dismissing them provides opportunity for technical words to be used: cooking, building, processes, how things work.

Drawing is a brilliant instigator for language. When children draw they are tapping into their imagination and responding to what they see and hear around them. From this they can talk about what they have drawn and as adults we can question and elaborate.

Games offer a fun way to build language. There are many games we can play in the car that encourage language - 20 questions, Scattergories, Eye-Spy (in all its many variable forms), classification games, Yes/No... There are also many board games for these cold rainy days that provide yet another opportunity for language - and they are so much fun too!

I am bringing up the importance of Vocabulary now because we approach a holiday time - a time in which many of us will have opportunities for new experiences, see new things and have unfamiliar concepts available to understand and explore. Looking ahead to the next few weeks, consider what opportunities may arise, or could be created, where language, whether expressed or received, can occur.

Dear Parents,

Parents play a key role in helping their children learn Mathematics concepts involving time, shape, measurement and number.

What parents can do to promote maths every day

Discussing and exploring mathematics with children requires no special resources. Instead, what is needed is awareness for parents about how to engage.

Listed below are a number of activities that are important for early maths learning which are easy for parents to use. These include:

- 1. Comparing objects and describing which is longer, shorter, heavier, or holds less.
- 2. Playing with and describing 2D shapes and 3D objects.
- 3. Describing where things are positioned, for example, north, outside, behind, opposite.
- 4. Describing, copying, and extending patterns found in everyday situations.
- 5. Using time-words to describe points in time, events and routines (including days, months, seasons and celebrations).
- 6. Comparing and talking about the duration of everyday events and the sequence in which they occur.
- 7. Saying number names forward in sequence to ten (and eventually to 20 and beyond).
- 8. Using numbers to describe and compare collections.
- 9. Using perceptual and conceptual subitising (recognising quantities based on visual patterns), counting and matching to compare the number of items in one collection with another.
- 10. Showing different ways to make a total (at first with models and small numbers).
- 11. Matching number names, symbols and quantities up to ten.

Games to play using everyday situations

Neuroscience research has provided crucial evidence about the importance of early nurturing and support for learning, brain development, and the development of positive dispositions for learning.

Early brain development or "learning" is all about the quality of children's sensory and motor experiences within positive and nurturing relationships and environments.

Sometimes it can be difficult to come up with activities and games to play that boost children's mathematics learning, but there are a variety of ways you can help your child build concepts in maths. For example, talk with your children as you prepare meals together. Talk about measuring and comparing ingredients and amounts.

You can play children's card games and games involving dice, such as Snakes and Ladders, or maps, shapes and money. You can also read stories and notice the mathematics – the sequence of events, and the descriptions of characters and settings.

Although these activities may seem simple and informal, they build on what children notice and question, give families the chance to talk about mathematical ideas and language, and show children that maths is used throughout the day.

Make it relevant to them

Most importantly, encouraging maths and numeracy in young children relies on making it appealing and relevant to them.

For example, when you take your child for a walk down the street, in the park or on the beach, bring their attention to the objects around them – houses, cars, trees, signs.

Talk about the shapes and sizes of the objects, talk about and look for similarities and differences (for example: let's find a taller tree or a heavier rock), count the number of cars parked in the street or time how long it takes to reach the next corner.

Discuss the temperature or the speed of your walking pace.

Collect leaves or shells, and make repeating patterns on the sand or grass, or play Mathematical I Spy (I spy with my little eye, something that's taller than mum).

So, from the earliest of ages, talk with your child about the world around them, being descriptive and using mathematical words. As they grow, build on what they notice about shapes, numbers, and measures. This is how you teach them Mathematics.
